FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Exams have started well for both our senior and junior students. Examinations can be a challenging time for students and preparation is the key to achieving their personal best. Our challenge to each of them is to:

- Set high standards for themselves
- Have the discipline to walk away from online distractions when there is work to be done
- Implement daily routines that they can adhere to
- Ask for help if they need it.

We expect all our students to focus on doing the 'simple stuff' really well. When they enter through our gates, there is attention to detail – arriving on time, with the correct uniform, holding doors open for others and greeting their teachers. These expectations set the tone for the College and help enhance the learning environment for all our families.

The recent report on attendance highlighted the importance of attending school regularly. At age 25, young adults who were chronically absent from school earn \$40000 less per year than what other 25 year olds earn. Students who are chronically absent from school earn about the same as the total population at 17 years old. However, over time their income becomes significantly less than the total population. At age 25, young adults who were chronically absent from school earn \$16667 compared to \$59235 for other 25 year olds.

The Importance of School Attendance

Did you know that skipping school can have a big impact on your child's future earnings? Studies show that students who miss a lot of school may earn significantly less money later in life.

Here's a breakdown:

- Age 25: Young adults who missed a lot of school earn about \$40,000 less per year than their peers who attended regularly.
- Over Time: While they may earn similar to the average 17-year-old, their income falls behind significantly as they get older.

To help your child succeed, please encourage them to attend school regularly. Every day counts! If you have any questions or concerns about your child's attendance, please don't hesitate to contact your child's teacher or the school office.

<u>Special Guest — Year 11 French</u>

Last Friday, the Year 11 French class enjoyed a dynamic and authentic visit from a native French speaker, Mme Ségolène de Fontenay. Ségolène originally comes from Metropolitan France, with family in Paris and other regions, and she has worked in a variety of managerial roles in the events, business, and not-for-profit sectors. It was an honour to receive a visit from a French-speaking professional of Ségolène's calibre, particularly when she proved so willing not only to speak to our students about her own background but also showed such curiosity about their own interests and aspirations. She also graciously partook in our weekly ritual of sharing French food, in this case crêpes cooked by the students (a first!).

As well as contributing to the lesson, Ségolène joined the week's session of after-school French Club, engaging in an extended one-to-one conversation in French with several students, structured according to the topics they have recently studied. Such opportunities to engage with a fluent speaker who is not their teacher considerably broaden students' experience of the language, particularly their ability to negotiate unfamiliar contexts in interactive speech.

Ségolène's visit marks the fourth and final encounter this year with a special French-speaking guest. Each of these visits, unique in their own right, have helped to animate and enliven the language for our students, layering the learning with humanity and humour. We are very grateful to Ségolène,



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as well as to our earlier guests, Baptiste Daumen and Maëlle Dubois, for their contribution to French at Ōtahuhu College — *merci beaucoup*!


