## FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Our sports teams are doing well in the summer terms, with the latest result seeing Kilikiti finishing second in the Auckland competition. Next week our Basketball and Volleyball teams are competing in their tournaments.

Attendance has been consistently above the national average for the last three weeks, and about ten percentage points higher than schools from similar communities. Messaging the school or writing notes to explain any absences helps as does scheduling appointments outside school hours when possible.

Academically our students are sitting on a 93% pass rate for internals so far . The work our teachers and students do both in the classroom and through homework and tutorials all contribute to these good results. The cumulative effect of all this effort is impressive.

## **Our Commitments**

For our students to be engaged in their own education, they must be encouraged to read, ask questions, actively engage in discussions, write and learn to think critically about challenging material. Every mistake our students make, every question they ask, and every time they successfully struggle with a concept, their brain grows a little bit stronger and smarter.

Each week our students receive an engagement grade based on a 1 to 5 scale. To get a 5, students need to attempt all classwork and homework and consistently strive to produce work at or above the level expected from this pupil as indicated by past academic results. You can help by encouraging your child to do homework work, and independent study. Encourage your child to always participate in class discussions, by volunteering to ask and answer questions.

## **Attendance**

Chronic absenteeism has a lifelong impact. Research shows that chronically absent students are far less likely to achieve qualifications and, as adults, earn \$40,000 less annually by age 25. This income gap highlights the importance of addressing absenteeism early.


At Otahuhu College, students who miss 10-15 days in a term are referred to Attendance Services for



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additional support, while those who miss 15 or more days trigger a referral to Oranga Tamariki. These steps are designed to identify and eliminate the barriers preventing students from attending school. Let's make attendance a priority to safeguard our students' futures.

## **Study News**


#### **English Help Centre**
