FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Today, I had a meeting with Erica Stanford, the Minister of Education. Many issues were discussed around education and how to improve the opportunities for our students. It is obviously testing times for the country and many families. What, however, gives me great optimism is the outstanding students and staff which I have the pleasure to work with each day.

As many parents know, the NCEA changes have also brought new co-requisites for literacy and numeracy. Students must pass these to gain any NCEA qualification. There are three digital assessments – numeracy, reading, and writing. In passing all three, students are then able to go on and gain their qualifications at Level 2 and UE. This year, the assessments are being held over the next two weeks and again in September.

This week we had the pleasure of welcoming ChildFund and Hillary Barry onto Otahuhu College. They were highly impressed by the high calibre of our students and the evident pride in who they are and their community.

Our Commitments

The focus for next week is being on time. Students are expected to be at school by 8:30am, and then seated in the correct space in assembly. With the weather due to change to more wintery conditions, your child should have a plan to get to school on wet days on time. With Auckland traffic this often means leaving 10-15 minutes earlier. For those students who are late to school three or more times in a week, they will be given a detention.

Attendance

Every day missed from school is a missed opportunity to learn, grow, and prepare for the future. Chronically absent students are significantly less likely to earn qualifications and, by age 25, they earn on average \$40,000 less annually than their regularly attending peers.

To support our students, Otahuhu College monitors absences closely. Students with 10-15 days absent per term are referred to Attendance Services, while those missing 15 or more days may be referred to Oranga Tamariki. These systems ensure students get the help they need to stay in school and secure better futures.

The big incentive for all students is that when they pass these Assessments, they never have to do them again! Students have been preparing well in their classes and at home and we look forward to seeing some good results.


