FROM OUR PRINCIPAL

Our Year 10 and Year 11 students have been sitting the Common Assessment Activities (CAAs) for Literacy this week. There has been a lot of work put into these by both students and staff alike and we are looking forward to getting the results later this term. Improving standards of literacy and numeracy are crucial for our students and for their brothers and sisters in the primary and Intermediate schools.

Family life can be very busy with a lot of commitments, so establishing routines together can make sure that your child is best prepared for success.

- Study every day, from the start of each year. This can be as simple as reviewing what was learnt during the day and coming up with good questions to ask the next day.
- Start studying with your difficult subjects first, then move onto your more enjoyable subjects.
- Study in 20-30 minute blocks having a break between each one.
- Phones and other devices should be charged in a common area, so they are not used to distract from study or late at night.
- Get a good night's sleep, teenagers generally need 8 –10 hours sleep a night.

Getting into routines at home for study will help your child succeed.

With the colder weather, it is good to see most students maintaining the high standards of uniform at Otahuhu College. When there is an issue with uniform, students are reminded to see their Dean first thing in the morning so that the issue can be sorted.

Once again our Attendance rate for the week has been above the national average for all secondary schools. Thank you for your support in ensuring that your children attend each and every day.

Our Commitments

Our commitment next week is to be respectful. There are simple ways in which we can encourage our children to be respectful. Using more formal language when talking to adults and in particular staff and visitors to Otahuhu College demonstrates respect. Attendance



Year 12 & 13 Students Shine at Their First MUNA Experience

On May 16 and 17, eight of our Year 12 and 13 students proudly participated in their very first Model United Nations Assembly (MUNA), organized by Rotary Auckland. The event was held at Rosmini College in Takapuna, with sessions kicking off bright and early at 7:30am each day. MUNA is a simulation of the real United Nations, where students take on the roles of country delegates and debate current global issues. It is a truly enriching experience that teaches diplomacy, critical thinking, teamwork, public speaking, and leadership.

Our students had been preparing since Term 1, diving into research, writing position papers, and practicing the formal procedures of UN-style debate. Representing the nations of **Norway** and **Argentina**, they entered the event with energy, passion, and a clear sense of purpose.

Despite this being their first MUNA, the students threw themselves into the experience wholeheartedly, lobbying, forming alliances, and debating passionately for their causes. They confidently gave speeches, answered challenging questions with grace, and boldly posed questions to other countries — truly embracing the spirit of international diplomacy.



A highlight came from **Team Argentina**, who submitted an insightful amendment to **Remit- 1: "That access to the internet be recognized as a universal human right."** While acknowledging the importance of internet access, they argued that for many developing countries, the focus must first be on infrastructure and digital education before such a right can be meaningfully implemented. Their amendment resonated with many delegates, securing **30 signed votes** and earning the well-deserved recognition for **Best Amendment for Remit 1**. They didn't just speak for Argentina – they powerfully represented Latin America and the Global South.



The feedback from all eight participants has been overwhelmingly positive. Students reflected on how the experience helped them learn the art of diplomacy, improve their public speaking, develop negotiation skills, and build friendships in a completely new environment. One common sentiment of Year 13 students was that they were sad they couldn't return next year — a true sign of how much this opportunity meant to them.

We are proud of the way our students represented their assigned countries and our school with maturity, confidence, and intelligence. Their performance reflected the values of international understanding, empathy, and responsibility.

MUNA was more than a debating competition — it was a powerful sight of global integration, where students explored international issues, witnessed how the United Nations works, and began their journey toward becoming thoughtful, informed, and active global citizens.



Stem News

Over the past three weeks, we had 137 students participate in the EPro8 Challenge School Competition. The EPro8 Challenge is a team-based event where students create practical solutions to various challenges. These challenges aim to encourage skills in science, math, engineering, and problem solving.

This year students tackled three specific challenges: The Jack in the Box, Shoe Throwing Scales and Ball Launcher. In the past, we faced the EPro8 Challenge with tasks that were easy to medium difficulty. However, this year the challenges were significantly tougher. Our students took on these difficult tasks with amazing determination and teamwork, achieving fantastic results. Their creativity and hard work truly stood out, and they met the challenges in the most inspiring way!


