Attendance

Did you know that chronically absent students, by the time they are 25 years old, earn an average of \$40,000 less per year than their peers who regularly attended school? Missing school doesn't just affect students' academic progress—it impacts their long-term career opportunities and financial stability.

At Otahuhu College, we take absenteeism seriously and intervene early to prevent long-term consequences. Students who miss 10-15 days in a term are referred to Attendance Services, while those with 15 or more days absent are reported to Oranga Tamariki. These measures ensure that students and their families get the support they need to prioritize attendance. Let's work together to secure brighter futures for our students.

Year 11 Focus: Academic Direction & Future Pathways

Over the next three weeks, our Year 11 students will be encouraged to refocus, set clear academic goals, and explore future career pathways. This will include a series of assemblies and career-focused sessions.

Conversations at Home

We encourage whānau to engage in meaningful discussions with their child around:

- What do they enjoy doing?
- Where do their strengths lie?
- How could these strengths align with a career?
- What subjects support entry into that career?

Our Goal

To help students understand the value of their studies, succeed in the Ōtāhuhu College Year 11 Pass criteria, and make informed choices for Year 12 subject selection and future pathways.

Year 11 Pass Criteria at Ōtāhuhu College

To PASS Year 11, students must:

- Achieve Level 1 Literacy (5 Reading & 5 Writing credits via CAA or alternate credits)
- Achieve Level 1 Numeracy (10 credits)



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- Maintain 80% attendance
- Earn an Engagement grade of 3 or above
- Participate in at least one extra-curricular activity

A student who does not achieve the above will be considered for a re-sit of their Year 11 Programme to be able to meet the expectations of studies in Year 12.


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Sports News
