- ENG/LIT Internal due Friday 29th August (5 Literacy credits)
- SPC Internal due Friday 29th August (5 Literacy credits)

Attendance at school next week for all Y11 students is essential in gaining the above credits. They need to be in class completing work to support them in gaining accreditation for their skills and to be prepared for the next level of study.

As you know, to gain an NCEA qualification at any level, students need to achieve a 20-credit corequisite. Our sessions will directly address the requirements of these exams, ensuring students are well prepared.

- Focus: Co-requisite exam preparation only
- Who: Any students working towards their NCEA qualification

This evening sessions are designed to complement the great work already happening in schools. Our goal is to support both schools and the wider community by giving students an extra boost of targeted preparation. The school garden is showing signs that spring is almost here.


Here is the back of the waharoa, carved by our whakairo students, covered in white puawhanaga, the native clematis.
