# From Our Principal

Congratulations to all our senior students for their efforts over this last week with exams. Over the next week students will be getting their results back, this is an important time for both students and for their families. Some students will be pleased with their results, others will be disappointed, that is the nature of these exams at this time of year. The key is not to be satisfied and to look at ways to improve. As parents it is very easy to focus on the marks our children got, and to talk to our daughters and sons about the need to improve. The better way to help our children is to talk about their preparation for the exams. How can they improve their preparation? Areas to talk about will be attending the tutorials, studying at home and making sure your son or daughter knows from their teachers which particular area they need to work on to get better.

Staff have been told that all classes throughout the last week including the last day must be used for productive and challenging learning, with students working right through to the end of the last teaching period. Your support in getting your child to school every day is essential.

#### **Our Commitments**

Our commitment this week is to be respectful. There are simple ways in which we can encourage our children to be respectful. Using more formal language when talking to adults and in particular staff and visitors to Otahuhu College demonstrates respect. ## **Attendance**

Did you know that chronically absent students, by the time they are 25 years old, earn an average of \$40,000 less per year than their peers who regularly attended school? Missing school doesn't just affect students' academic progress—it impacts their long-term career opportunities and financial stability.

At Otahuhu College, we take absenteeism seriously and intervene early to prevent long-term consequences. Students who miss 10-15 days in a term are referred to Attendance Services, while those with 15 or more days absent are reported to Oranga Tamariki. These measures ensure that students and their families get the support they need to prioritize attendance. Let's work together to secure brighter futures for our students.


#### <u>Pāparakuihi - Breakfast Club</u>
