## **Holiday Revision – Preparing for NCEA Exams**

While the holidays are a valuable time to rest and recharge, it's also important that students maintain momentum as they prepare for their upcoming NCEA Level 1 exams in November.

Here are some effective revision strategies students can use at home:

- Set a Study Schedule: Break revision into manageable chunks across the break. Aim for short, focused sessions (30–45 minutes) with regular breaks.
- Use Past Papers: Practice with previous NCEA exam papers to become familiar with question formats and time management.
- Create Summary Notes: Condense key concepts into mind maps, flashcards, or bullet-point summaries.
- Teach Someone Else: Explaining a topic to a friend or family member helps reinforce understanding.
- Use Online Tools: Platforms like Studylt, NZQA, and subject-specific YouTube channels offer great revision resources.
- Balance is Key: Encourage a healthy mix of study, rest, and physical activity to stay refreshed and motivated.

We encourage all students to make the most of this time to prepare confidently for their final assessments.

## **Arts and Culture News**

On Friday, 12th September, our Year 12 and 13 Dance class had the exceptional opportunity to perform in the 'Rising Stars' Dance Showcase held at Mangere Arts Centre. This event was part of a creative health initiative in collaboration with Brown Pride and BEAST Dance Collective, supported by Te Whatu Ora's Alcohol Harm Prevention program. The Kaupapa engaged four South Auckland schools—Alfriston, Aorere, Mangere, and Otahuhu Colleges, utilizing dance and movement as powerful tools to explore themes of mental health, identity, and alcohol harm prevention. Our lead choreographers were Corbyn Taulealea-Huch and Byron Fa'aui. Additionally, the students had the valuable opportunity to contribute their own original choreography, showcasing the exceptional creativity of our gifted dancers - an element that was clearly evident throughout the show.

Our technical rehearsal began at 3 PM. Although many of our Year 12 and 13 students were relatively new to performing in such a setting, the positive feedback from students and teachers from other schools was



overwhelmingly encouraging. Our students represented our school with outstanding energy and professionalism, and I am immensely proud of how they conducted themselves throughout the event.

The Rising Stars Showcase was a huge success, culminating in a vibrant celebration with family and friends in attendance. It was especially meaningful that the event was free, allowing the wider community to support and engage with our talented young performers. Many families expressed excitement and gratitude for the opportunity to witness their children perform live, particularly for those experiencing a stage performance for the first time. It was a privilege to provide our students with this memorable experience, and I look forward to the next as this will not be the last time these students will be seen on stage :)

On Thursday 18 September, Rocket Lab, a private aerospace company based in Auckland, gave our students a rare opportunity to tour its facilities, including the rocket factory and mission control. The tour offered a fascinating behind the scenes look at the development and manufacturing of the Electron rocket.

Twenty of our Year 11 and Year 12 students took part in the visit. They learnt about the different stages of building a rocket, explored the physics and chemistry behind rocket dynamics, and saw the impressive range of equipment and machinery involved in the process.
