## From Our Principal

Welcome back to the start of the fourth term. It has been great to see so many students taking advantage of the last two weeks of the tutorials, workshops and programmes that are available.

This term is important for all students at Otahuhu College. For our Year 9 and 10 students they have exams which will determine which classes they are in next year. Our seniors face NCEA externals and the completion of final internals. As a school every staff member will be doing their very best to help lift the academic achievement of our students. There will be many tutorials and workshops available, and all students must be at school every day to take advantage of the expert support which is available. Unfortunately, it is likely that this term will be disrupted by industrial action. If that happens our priority will be our Year 12 and 13 students. With that in mind we have a contingency plan in place so that school will continue for Year 12 and 13 students despite any proposed industrial action and all year 12 and 13 students will be expected at school.

On Thursday night we celebrated our first awards evening of the year. Service Awards is recognition for the mainly unseen work done by our students in service to others and the wider community. A long-standing tradition of the College, and a chance to acknowledge so many outstanding young men and women.

### **Our Commitments**

Our commitment is to be respectful. A key part of being respectful is using appropriate language. Learning what words, and indeed the volume, you use in different circumstances is one of the challenges of growing up into young men and women. Teenagers find this hard to do, so talking to them and explaining how different situations require the use of different words and mannerisms is a great step on developing articulate respectful young men and women.

### **Attendance**

Chronic absenteeism has a lifelong impact. Research shows that chronically absent students are far less likely to achieve qualifications and, as adults, earn \$40,000 less annually by age 25. This income gap highlights the importance of addressing absenteeism early.

At Otahuhu College, students who miss 10-15 days in a term are referred to Attendance Services for additional support, while those who miss 15 or more days trigger a referral to Oranga Tamariki. These steps are designed to identify and eliminate the barriers preventing students from attending school. Let's make attendance a priority to safeguard our students' futures.

Countdown to Level 1 Exams – 4 Weeks to Go! Level 1 exams, which contribute toward students' Certificates of Educational Achievement, begin in just four weeks.

With limited time remaining, it is essential that Year 11 students focus their efforts on:

- Attending all scheduled tutorials and support sessions
- Engaging fully in class activities and discussions
- Committing to consistent and focused home study

These final weeks are critical. Prioritising preparation now will place students in the strongest possible position to succeed in their NCEA Level 1 assessments.

Year 11 students are working toward successfully completing the academic year in alignment with the expectations set by Ōtāhuhu College at the beginning of the year.

Students who do not meet the basic requirements by the end of Term 4 may be required to either re-sit specific Level 1 subjects or repeat Year 11 in 2026.

We encourage all students to stay focused, seek support when needed, and make the most of the remaining weeks to achieve their goals.

#### New School Sports Rule Coming in 2026

From 2026, students across New Zealand will need to have at least **80% school attendance** if they want to play in school sports teams.

The new rule, set by **the Ministry of Education and School Sport New Zealand**, aims to get students coming to school more often and taking their studies seriously. The idea is that if students want to play sports, they also need to show up and put effort into their schoolwork.

Many teachers and principals support the change, saying that being at school regularly helps students build good habits like discipline, teamwork, and commitment — the same skills that help in sports.
